Ad hoc analysis of individuals participating in the Future Jobs Fund

Background

Information on the number of starts on the Future Jobs Fund has been published previously at http://statistics.dwp.gov.uk/asd/asd1/jsa/ypg/ypg_oct2011.pdf

The figures presented here show the number of people participating on the Future Jobs Fund at the end of each calendar month during the period of its operation.

The Future Jobs Fund (FJF) was introduced from October 2009. Future Jobs Fund jobs were primarily aimed at 18 to 24 year olds who had been out of work for at least six months, although some were targeted at long-term benefit claimants aged 25 or over in areas of high unemployment or inactivity.

Notes

- 1. The are two potential data sources for the Future Jobs Fund: (1) payments data recorded by DWP payments teams, and (2) the Labour Market System (LMS), which is used by Jobcentre Plus to manage claimant support.
- 2. Payments data were initially used as the primary source of official statistics on FJF. However, the process for extracting individual level data proved burdensome and the growing need for more detailed breakdowns of the characteristics of participants led to data from the Labour Market System being used instead. - 3. As the LMS database does not record end dates it is not possible to use it to estimate the number of people on the Future Jobs Fund at any one time. The statistics shown here therefore make use of payments data.
- 4. At a headline level the starts data on which the caseloads presented here are based are broadly consistent with the already-published official statistics on starts. There may be small discrepancies in the starts figures for individual months due to differences in the way information on FJF was recorded. For example, LMS records the actual start date on the programme while the payments system used the nearest Monday or Friday.
